Introduction

Remember that marriage was God's ideal from the beginning, so be careful not to turn an ideal into an ordeal, and then look for a new deal.

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Every other aspect of creation had its counterpart: Day had the sun, night had the moon, water had fish, sky had birds, and the ground had animals. But man had no partner. Before there was a man or woman, there was God, and He always intended to be Adam's first love. "So the LORD God caused the man to fall into a deep sleep; and while he was sleeping, he took one of the man's ribs and then closed up the place with flesh" (Genesis 2:21, NIV). See how God took the first woman from the man's side, to be by his side. Not above him, not below him, but beside him. "Then the LORD God made a woman from the rib he had taken out of the man, and he brought her to the man" (Genesis 2:22, NIV). Notice that God brought Adam a woman, not a man. Consider also that according to God's design, there are only two genders, and they alone make up a true biblical marriage. From beginning to end, marriage has never primarily been about a woman and a man; it's been about God. Whose idea was this marriage? God's. Who planned it? God. Who provided the husband and presented the bride? God. Eve becomes the only bride given away by God Himself. God is still in the building business and the bringing business, and when you respect marriage as His initiative, you will receive the person and blessing He brings.

The only person you should ever consider marrying is the person you truly believe God has brought to you.



3. Respect Marriage As a Divine Institution

When God brings Eve to Adam, we see the actual wedding ceremony. “The man said, ‘This is now bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh; she shall be called “woman,” for she was taken out of man’” (Genesis 2:23, NIV). The Hebrew word for woman (*Ishah*) comes from *anash* meaning “fragile,” while man (*Ish*) comes from *usah* which means “strength.” God built masculinity into men and femininity into women, and male and female are the only two pieces of the marriage puzzle that fit together. The phrase “suitable helper” uses the Hebrew *kenegdo*—a combination of *ke* (like) and *neged* (opposite). Eve is like Adam as a human created in God’s image, but different as a woman, not a man. “That is why a man leaves his father and mother and is united to his wife, and they become one flesh” (Genesis 2:24, NIV). The Hebrew word “one” (*echad*) describes unity with diversity, like God being one yet three persons. There’s not uniformity, but there is unity. God’s divine institution is woven into the very DNA of humanity. God’s Word is not subject to change. What He has established in creation, He intends to transcend culture and time.

Honor marriage as God's first institution, designed to be the foundation of family, which is the foundation of nations.

Key Takeaway

Every marriage should be made in Heaven, manufactured by Heaven, and mastered by Heaven. When you put Christ at the head of your marriage, you'll have a marriage that's made in Heaven.

Introduction

What if finding the right person to marry isn't actually the secret to a happy marriage? Everyone wants a fairy-tale marriage, but it's a tragedy when fairy tales turn into horror stories because we misplace our expectations. The real problem is this: Every person wanting to get married is looking for the right person, but it will do you no good to find the right person if you are not the right person to be married to. That's why every marriage should begin with not just a husband and wife, but a *godly* husband and a *godly* wife. A marriage made in Heaven begins with a spouse given by Heaven. Learn the three specific things every heavenly-given husband must do for his wife to create a marriage that truly is happily ever after.

Key Points

1. Provide Humble Leadership

What kind of leadership do you think a husband should provide in marriage? In Ephesians five, Paul says this: "For the husband is the head of the wife as Christ is the head of the church, his body, of which he is the Savior" (Ephesians 5:23, NIV). The word "head" means "authority," but being an authority does not mean being an authoritarian. The husband is to exercise authority over his wife in the same way that Christ exercises authority over the church. Jesus never forced anybody to do anything. He doesn't bully the church, throw His weight around, yell, scream, or demand anything. Jesus led His disciples by serving them. He was a servant leader who said, "For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Mark 10:45, NIV). Husbands need to have a foot-washing mentality when it comes to their wives. Lyrics from an old country song say it this way: "A woman wants a man she can look up to that won't look down on her."

If a husband looks up to his wife by serving her, she will look up to him by following his leadership. But his leadership cannot be haughty; it must be humble.

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2. Practice Heavenly Love

How should a husband love his wife according to God's design? Paul commands this, "Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her ..." (Ephesians 5:25, NIV). When the husbands in Ephesus first heard these words, they probably fell out of their chairs because this was absolutely revolutionary. Paul uses the word *agape*—the same word used in John 3:16. It's the love you give when someone's unlovable, and seems undeserving. This kind of love is not a feeling; it's a command. It's an act of the will that always puts the other person first. Paul asks the bigger question: Do you love your wife enough not just to die for her, but to die to yourself and live for her? You've got to die to what you want out of the marriage and start living for what you can give to the marriage. Paul says to love your wives "as [your] own bodies" (Ephesians 5:28, NIV). We love our bodies every day: When it's hungry, we feed it; when it's thirsty, we water it; when it's tired, we rest it.

A husband is to love his wife the way he loves his body—by providing for her, protecting her, and putting her needs above his own.

3. Promise Divine Loyalty

Paul concludes by going back to the first marriage: "For this reason a man will leave his father and mother and be united to his wife, and the two will become one flesh" (Ephesians 5:31, NIV). Marriage is a covenant relationship where the husband is to be united to his wife through a covenant, an oath, a binding promise. Malachi 2:14 calls the wife "your partner, the wife of

Reflection Questions

1. How does Jesus' example of servant leadership challenge the way husbands think about being "head" of their home? If you are a husband, what would humble leadership look like in your daily interactions with your wife?

2. What does it mean to you that marriage is a covenant, not just a contract? How does understanding that your marriage mirrors Christ's relationship with the church change your perspective on your commitment?

3. For husbands: Paul emphasizes that if your wife is not being drawn closer to Jesus by the way you're leading and loving her, you're not the husband you ought to be. How are you providing spiritual leadership in your home?

I heard a story about a daughter who wrote her dad about marrying someone she met online: “We met on eHarmony, became friends on Facebook, had long chats on WhatsApp. He proposed on Zoom.” Her dad replied, “I suggest you two get married on X, have fun on Tango, buy your kids on Amazon, and, when you get fed up with this new husband, just sell him on eBay.” There are lots of views today on what marriage is, but the one opinion that should really matter is that of the One who invented marriage—Jesus. Even though Jesus was single and never married, He knew more about marriage than any marriage counselor because marriage was His idea. When the Pharisees asked Him about divorce, Jesus didn’t answer their question about how to get out of marriage. Instead, He explained why you should stay in marriage. In one simple but unbelievably strong sentence, Jesus taught that in marriage math, $1 + 1 = 1$. In this passage, Jesus outlined the three principles you need to guard what God has established and, in doing so, fulfill His purpose in your life.

Key Points

1. Commend God's Plan for Marriage

Why do you think Jesus started His teaching about marriage with God's original design? In Matthew 19, Jesus declares, "Haven't you read ... that at the beginning the Creator 'made them male and female'" (v. 4, NIV). Jesus is not just giving His opinion on marriage. He goes back to the very beginning to establish the foundation of God's original plan for marriage. This one statement tells us what the inventor of marriage intended for marriage to look like from creation: a male and a female joined together. Jesus builds three characteristics into marriage. First is duality: It takes two human beings to get married. You can't marry your dog or your car. Second is heterosexuality: He did not create them male and male or female and female, but male and female. Third is monogamy: He created one male and one female, not many males and many

3. Whether single or married, how can you better support God’s design for marriage in a culture that is increasingly moving away from His original plan?

Introduction

Ever wondered the secret to marriages that last 60 years? I heard about an elderly couple celebrating their diamond anniversary who shared their story: On their honeymoon at the Grand Canyon, the wife's mule stumbled, and she said calmly to the animal, "That's once." When it stumbled again, she said, "That's twice." The third time, she got off and shot the mule right between the eyes. When her husband asked why, she looked him in the eyes and said, "That's once"—and they never had another major disagreement! While there's humor in that story, the truth is that God desires for everyone who gets married to truly live happily ever after. When two people get married, it's God's will for that marriage to be a happy union instead of a civil war. He wants every marriage to end in celebration, not separation, enjoying marriage, not enduring it. That's why God's Word gives us a marriage example through an old love song: It's King Solomon's Song of Songs. In this book, you find the four essential keys to building a marriage that lasts.

Key Points

1. Communicate Love Through Treasured Talk

Happily married couples talk to each other in the right way and use the right words. Solomon knew the way to a woman's heart is through her ears, telling his wife, "How beautiful you are, my darling! Oh, how beautiful!" and "You are altogether beautiful, my darling; there is no flaw in you" (Song of Songs 1:15; 4:7, NIV). He's telling his wife she's perfectly beautiful and to him beautifully perfect, affirming her and building her up. World-renowned relationship expert John Gottman discovered the 5:1 ratio. That is, for every one negative interaction in a relationship, you need five positive interactions. Always be looking for the good and the positive. You are to seek to say the right thing, the right way, at the right time, but what's even more important is that you keep saying things and keep talking.
